AN EASTER IN SOLITUDE

Dear Parishioners of St. Walter-

The title of this letter, "An Easter in Solitude," are the words Pope Francis spoke this past Easter Sunday in his homily. I hope all of you were able to enjoy Easter under these unusual circumstances. Many of you have mentioned how you have watched Holy Week either on television or through some other social media outlet. While certainly not the same as being at St. Walter, I hope these Masses for Holy Week offered some comfort and assurance to all of you.

One of the liturgies I enjoyed very much was the Good Friday service from Rome with Pope Francis. Fr. Raniero Cantalamessa, OSM., CAP., gave the homily. He quoted a reflection that recently came from a Jewish rabbi who said: "That we have the opportunity to celebrate a very special Paschal Exodus this year. That from the exile of consciousness, it took merely the smallest and most formless element of nature, a virus, to remind us that we are mortal. That military power or technology are not sufficient to save us. As the psalm in the Bible says, 'In his prime, man does not understand he is like the beasts. He perishes just like them.'" How true it is.

But Fr. Cantalamessa moves forward from the sober words of the Rabbi. He says, "We have forgotten about building walls, the virus knows no borders. In an instant, it has broken all the barriers and distinctions of race, nation, religion, wealth and power. We should not revert to that prior time when this moment has passed. As the Holy Father has exhorted us, we should not waste this opportunity. He says, "Let us not allow that so much pain, so many deaths, and so much heroic engagement on the past of health workers to have been in vain. Returning to the way things were is a recession we should fear the most. We should not return to the former way of life like Lazarus, but the new life like Jesus. We need to become more fraternal, more human, more Christian."

Let this be our hope, our light, and guide during these fifty days of Easter. And as we approach Divine Mercy Sunday this weekend, let us reflect on the image of Jesus on the cross with blood and water coming forth from his side. Let us remember that Jesus' suffering washes us clean. On this Divine Mercy Sunday, let us pray with renewed confidence, "Jesus, I trust in you." Be sure to pray the chaplet of Divine Mercy on EWTN every day at 2:00pm.

Please continue to pray for all those who are suffering from this disease, those who have died and will die, those who are in nursing homes, all medical staff and police officers who are on

the front line saving lives and helping people, grocery store workers, and for the many people who are unemployed.

6:00 p.m. - Prayer for people of every nation and their leaders

Lord, the pandemic opens our eyes to see each other as brothers and sisters in one human family. We pray for people of every nation and their leaders, asking that they be inspired to seek the good of all and quell the voices of division. We ask this in Jesus' Name. AMEN

9:00 p.m. - Prayer for those who have died today

Lord, we grieve the passing of our sisters and brothers who have died this day. We commend them to your tender mercy, confident that nothing, not even death, will separate us from your love. We ask this in Jesus' Name. AMEN
